technology in their pursuit of employment.

The mobile jobs buses visit libraries, technical colleges, local schools, public housing, veteran's events, and other locations where the services are requested, Thomas said.

"Our biggest service is helping prepare resumes," Thomas said. "If you've never prepared one, we'll help you write a resume."

The vehicles also are available at job fairs allowing job seekers a place to search for job openings and submit resumes and applications.

"We're here, once or twice a month, or as often as necessary," Thomas said. "We're also able to help connect job seekers with jobs through the Georgia Depart-

ment of Labor."

The jobs bus also is capable of conducting testing for individuals, such as the TABE, and instructing clients on using skill-enhancing software like the Mavis Beacon Typing Test and resume writing programs, Thomas said.

The training units also will be used in Rapid Response scenarios to provide a convenient place for employees to access unemployment insurance and search for future employment. Vehicles can be parked on site at business locations as needed to provide easy access, Thomas said.

The purpose of Workforce Development is to assist eligible youth and adults in the Georgia Mountains region with the educational and retrain-

ing skills necessary to enter today's workforce, Thomas said.

Eligible individuals in need of training may receive financial support with tuition, books, required supplies and supportive services while enrolled in Occupational Skills Training. Middle and high school age students are also eligible to receive tutoring and GED assistance, Thomas said.

Available programs include Adult and Dislocated Worker, On the Job Training, and Youth assistance.

YHC President Cathy Cox presented Yearwood with an honorary doctor of music degree.

One of the highest-selling female artists in country music history, Yearwood broke onto the Nashville music scene in 1991.

She has recorded 12 albums and has had nine No. 1 songs and 20 top 10 hits.

She has won three Grammy Awards, three Country Music Association Awards, two Academy of Country Music Awards, an American Music Award and a Pollstar Industry Award for touring.

Yearwood has also released three successful cookbooks, which earned her the status of two-time *New York Times* bestselling author.

She currently hosts "Trisha's Southern Kitchen," a culinary series on Food Network that earned her an Emmy Award for "Outstanding Culinary Program."

While at YHC, Yearwood participated in musical ensembles, chorus, plays and operettas.

She and her sister, fellow YHC alumna Beth Yearwood Bernard, Class of '81, of Tifton, who attended the ceremony, were both members of the Dorcas Society and each served as president of the Sigma Beta Sigma sorority.

"I made the best friends of my life at YHC. We have stayed connected to Young Harris; we haven't always been on the campus, but we have gotten together almost once a year since we graduated," Yearwood said. "There's a bond, and it's really hard to describe. People ask, 'What is so special about Young Harris?' It's the people who are here."

The Young Harris College Medallion, the highest honor bestowed by YHC to alumni and friends who have made extraordinary contributions, was awarded to Richard and Shirley McGinnis of Johns Creek.

Richard joined YHC's Board of Trustees in 2004, and the couple has enhanced campus programming and student experiences for more than a decade by supporting the College in many ways.

They recently expressed their enthusiasm for the fine arts with a \$4 million gift that is serving as seed money for the development and design of a new performing arts center.

YHC is among an elite group of Southeastern colleges and universities who annually bestow the prestigious Algernon Sydney Sullivan Foundation Awards on outstanding

male and female graduating seniors.

President Cox presented this year's Algernon Sydney Sullivan Award to David Atwood of Waynesville, N.C., and the Mary Mildred Sullivan Award to Alyssa Lowery of Conyers.

Created nearly a century ago to honor the service leadership of their namesakes, the awards are given annually by the Foundation to individuals whose nobility of character and dedication to service sets them apart as examples for others.

President Cox also presented three special awards to 10 outstanding students during the ceremony.

In addition to Stewart, the Dr. Charles R. Clegg Outstanding Scholar Award was presented to Sara Beaster of Murphy, N.C., Tiffany Goebel of Murphy N.C., Mark "Aaron" O'Tuel of Hartwell, Sarah Puett of Warne, N.C., and Jacqueline Tallman of Hayesville, N.C.

Ashley Cross of Murphy, N.C., and Emily Espy of Cumming, were presented the Zell B. Miller Leadership Award for significant contributions to campus life at YHC as outstanding leaders and role models.

The award's name honors former U.S. Senator and Georgia Governor Zell B. Miller, Class of '51, a YHC trustee and distinguished alumnus.

Miller was in attendance at the ceremony to personally congratulate the recipients along with his wife and YHC alumni, Shirley Miller, Class of '54.

Brian Walker, of Powder Springs, and Carol Raterman of Lawrenceville, received the Young Harris Spirit Award, which recognizes the students who best demonstrate outstanding levels of personal integrity, friendliness and engagement with the campus community.
