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and that child never went a day without telling me that he loved me.

"My last conversation with him on Saturday morning was 'Mom, don't you worry about me, I love ing to friends at the scene."

A Union County Sheriff's Office patrol boat was in the area when Worley went down, Sheriff Stephens said.

"We had our boat in the water about two coves over and we were able to respond quickly," Sheriff Stephens said. "The guys on the boat hit the water as soon as they got to the scene."

"The first call came into dispatch at 4:45 p.m., we got in motion at 4:46 p.m.," Sheriff Stephens said.

Sheriff Stephens immediately requested the Union County Dive Team, rangers from the Georgia Department of Natural Resources and additional backup from the U.S. Forest Service rangers.

DNR rangers used their boat with side-mount sonar search equipment Saturday evening until 10 p.m. The search was called off because of the dangers of night diving, Sheriff Stephens said.

Around 7 a.m. on Sunday, the recovery crew began another sweep of the area with the sonar equipment where Worley was believed to have gone down. About 9:40 a.m. on Sunday,

the first divers hit the water after a sonar scan of the water.

Union County divers searched the area, encountering depths of more than 50 feet, until shortly after 1 p.m. on Sunday. Cadaver dogs were brought from Alpha Search and Rescue, who searched the area from the Union County Sheriff's Office pontoon.

At 2 p.m. on Sunday, Sheriff Stephens made a call to Dawson County Sheriff Billy Carlisle asking for mutual aid assistance from Sheriff Carlisle's dive team, led by Dawson County Sheriff's Major Greg Rowan.

The Dawson County Dive Team searched until late Sunday evening before the dive had to be called due to expiration of dive team members' time in the water.

On Monday, members of the Georgia State Patrol Dive Team were there, rangers with the U.S. Forest Service, a member of the Commerce Police Department, a member of the Demorest Fire Department, a member of Hart County Emergency Management Agency and personnel with the Union County Commissioner's Office, including Sole Commissioner Lamar Paris.

Worley's body has been sent to the State Crime Laboratory in Decatur for an autopsy, according to Worley's mother Shannon Ashe.

"In addition to all the resort workers, we had lots of volunteers from S.A.F.E. and Family Connections assisting with the different events," said Rogers.

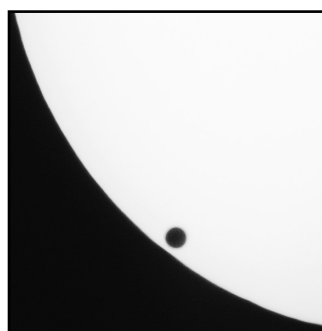
The proceeds from Saturday's event will be split between these two very worthy organizations.

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Rollins Planetarium showcases rare astronomical event

Young Harris College's O. Wayne Rollins Planetarium will present a special planetarium show at 5:30 p.m. on Tuesday, June 5, to showcase a rare astronomical event as the planet Venus passes directly in front of the sun. Immediately following the show, visitors will have the opportunity to safely observe the transit of Venus at 6 p.m. outside Maxwell Center on the YHC campus. Admission is \$2 for adults, \$1 for children and free with YHC ID.

A transit of Venus is among the rarest of predictable astronomical events, and the next one will not occur until 2117. Such transits were once considered to be of great scientific importance. In the 18th

and 19th centuries, nations sent teams of astronomers around the globe in a quest to measure the size of the earth's solar system. Today, astronomers use the transit method to discover new planets around distant stars. Now you have the opportunity to enjoy a front-row seat to this cosmic spectacle!

The show at 5:30 p.m. will include a simulation of the transit using the planetarium's full-dome digital projection system. During the transit, Venus will appear as a small black dot moving across the face of the sun.

Safe viewing of the transit through a telescope requires special filters and optical instruments. Two properly outfitted telescopes will be set up outside Maxwell Center for optimal viewing between 6 and 7 p.m.

For a safe, non-magnified viewing of the transit of Venus, visitors can use specially coated solar viewing glasses that can also be used to view solar eclipses. A limited number of these glasses will be available free of charge at the planetarium on a first-come, first-served basis.

O. Wayne Rollins Plan-

etarium features a state-of-the-art GOTO Chronos Space Simulator star projector with a state-of-the-art full-dome digital projection system, the Sky-Skan Definiti, in a 40-foot dome theater. Recently renovated with comfortable seating for 104, Rollins Planetarium offers public shows and educational opportunities for school groups throughout the year. Rollins Planetarium is located in the Maxwell Center on the campus of Young Harris College.
