



Young Harris College's O. Wayne Rollins Planetarium will present a special planetarium show at 5:30 p.m. on Tuesday, June 5, to showcase a rare astronomical event as the planet Venus passes directly in front of the sun. Immediately following the show, visitors will have the opportunity to safely observe the transit of Venus at 6 p.m. outside Maxwell Center on the YHC campus. Admission is \$2 for adults, \$1 for children and free

with YHC ID. A transit of Venus is among the rarest of predictable astronomical events, and the next one will not occur until 2117. Such transits were once considered to be of great scientific importance. In the 18th

teams of astronomers around the globe in a quest to measure the size of the earth's solar system. Today, astronomers use the transit method to discover new planets around distant suns. Now you have the opportunity to enjoy a front-row seat to this cosmic spectacle!

The show at 5:30 p.m. will include a simulation of the transit using the planetarium's full-dome digital projection system. During the transit, Venus will appear as a small black dot moving across the face of the sun.

Safe viewing of the transit through a telescope requires special filters and optical instruments. Two properly outfitted telescopes will be set up outside Maxwell Center for optimal viewing between 6

For a safe, non-magnified viewing of the transit of Venus, visitors can also use specially coated solar viewing glasses that can also be used to view solar eclipses. A limited number of these glasses will be available free of charge at the planetarium on a first-come,
