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Signups continue for Towns County Youth Football Camp

Towns County Youth Football Camp will take place Saturday, July 11, from 8 a.m. until noon at the Towns County High School practice football field, and signups continue Saturday, June 20, between 2 p.m. and 4 p.m. at the Towns County Recreation and Conference Center.

Interested young athletes and their parents should bring a copy of their child's birth certificate at signup, as it will be provided to the Smoky Mountain Conference (SMC) as proof of age.

The camp will be free, but a one-time payment of \$90 will be required at the time of signup in order to cover costs of playing during the season, including insurance, a game jersey that kids will get to keep at the end of the season, and a trophy at the end-of-year banquet.

Athletes can also sign up on Saturday, June 27, at the new rec center between 2 p.m. and 4 p.m., as well as the day of the camp, July 11.

Again, in order to be

accepted on one of the teams, parents will need to provide a copy of their child's birth certificate at the time of signup, along with the \$90.

Kids who played last year will not need to provide

copies of their birth certificates at signup.

Teams are broken down into categories according to age: Pee Wees are 5 and 6-year-olds; Termites are 7 and 8-year-olds; Mites are 9 and 10-year-

Towns County Wrestling goes back to work with summer practices

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
Towns County Wrestling has hit the mat for summer practices, and Indians Head Coach Jeff Stowers is happy to be back at it.

"We just got back from wrestling camp," said Coach Stowers. "We went four days at Shorter University with some of the high school guys to the Fellowship of Christian Athletes Camp, and had a good time up there."

The camp had the boys working eight hours a day, learning from some of the best wrestling professionals in the country.

"They were beat up and banged up and tired when we got done, but they learned a lot and got to hear some amazing coaches," said Coach Stowers. "Tom Ryan, who is the head coach at Ohio State - they just won the national title this year - was there, and did two clinic sessions. And Mike McArthur, who is an Olympian and three-time All-American and World Team Leader was there. John Azevedo from California was there, and he was an Olympian - just some amazing coaches."

Even Coach Stowers learned a thing or two, and plans to incorporate some new techniques when wrestling



starts back in the fall.

"That's the thing about camp, if you leave with one thing that you can use then I feel like it was worthwhile," said Coach Stowers. "I really picked up a couple of things that we're going to try to implement next year, some armbars stuff that Coach McArthur talked about, and some practice stuff and program stuff that Coach Ryan talked about that I think really clicked with me."

"We're going to try to implement that as much as we can," Coach Stowers continued. "We're going to have to modify it a little bit for the high

school level. These guys have a profound amount of experience, and you just kind of try to sit around, pick their brain and come up with some things that you can use. I think we learned a lot, I think the kids learned a lot, and I learned a lot, too, so it was a worthwhile trip."

This Thursday, Coach Stowers is taking a small group of Indians to Fannin County High School to grapple against other schools, namely Chestatee High School and high schools from Fannin and Gilmer counties, possibly Union County High School.

"Hopefully there will be four or five teams there, and we're just going to let the kids wrestle matches for about two and a half, three hours," said Coach Stowers. "They're going to have three or four mats on the floor, and they're just going to wrestle nonstop, just to try to

get some mat time in and some practice stuff in. It ought to be a good time."

This past season blew by in a whirlwind of success, as the team won its 100th match since the program began 10 years ago, ending the season with 120 total school victories.

Those numbers speak volumes to the growth of Towns County Wrestling, as the Indians didn't win any dual matches their first three seasons due to low enrollment totals, and only won one match in their fourth.

"It took a while to get started," said Coach Stowers. "We started the first year and had five kids, then we went up to seven kids. And really, when your numbers are like that, you don't have any chance to win a dual match. At first, we were beat before we got on the bus

to go down where we were going - just mathematically, you couldn't win."

"It's taken a long time and it's taken a lot of work on account of a lot of people,

but we're finally to the point where we're competitive with, I would say, 70 percent of the teams in the state, regardless of classification."

And Coach Stowers is not just boasting - this past season, Towns County Indians wrestled for true second and a chance to head to State Duals, being only narrowly defeated by St. Francis to clench third place at Class A Area Duals in Athens.

Overall, the Indians finished the 2014-2015 season with a solid 24-10 dual record, and three Indians were able to medal individually at the 2015 GHSA Class A Traditional State Tournament - Daulton Rogers, Kaine Hoffman and Thomas Mitchell.

"I'm happy with where we're at, but we can always do better, and we'll keep working to get better," said Coach Stowers. "We're just going to keep on plugging along."
