

County amends service delivery system

Towns County Sole Commissioner Bill Kendall only had one item on the docket for the annual monthly meeting last Thursday, but it was an important resolution.

The State of Georgia's Department of Community Affairs must approve the Service Delivery System for Towns County in order for the whole of Towns County to qualify for any State or Federal Funding. The Commissioner's office had to explain why five of the required statements in House Bill 489 didn't expressly fit the functioning of the agreement in Towns County.

28th Annual British Motorcycle Rally



This past weekend, the Greater Atlanta British Motorcycle Association (GABA) held its 28th annual "British in the Blue Ridge Rally and Bike Show" at the Georgia Mountain Fair (GMF).

This is the first year the Rally was held at the Fairgrounds after the group has held its event at Bald Mountain Campground for the past 18 years.

When asked why the GABA chose the GMF for their event, Robert Underwood, Rally Director, and Director of Event said, "We love it here in Hiawassee, and this is a great location. There is easy riding from everywhere, and great accommodations."

There wasn't an empty spot in the Campground as the British Motorcycle enthusiasts filled campsites on both sides of the highway. This year's rally

Georgia Mountain Fair begins its new summer schedule

Since its inception in 1950 as a three day agricultural exposition, that was held in the recreation area of the Towns County High School, the Georgia Mountain Fair has grown into one of the premiere fairs in the State of Georgia.

As early as the 1970's there were over 100,000 attendees each year, which prompted officials to pursue a larger venue for the production. Fair representatives, with the aid of the Towns County Lions Club, purchased land on Lake Chatuge that the Fair would call home. In 1978, the new Georgia Mountain Fairgrounds hosted its first ever fair at the new facility.

Today the fairgrounds are home to the GMF and several other main events of which many are going on during the summer months. This summer will be even better than before and Executive Director Hilda Thomason is very excited.

"I am thrilled about the upcoming events on the docket for this summer and during the fair in July. It has been a struggle to improve the fair itself but I believe that this summer will be the best ever.



We will have fireworks on July 4 starting at 9:30 p.m. followed by the Georgia Mountain Fair starting on July 19 and running through July 27. One note of interest, especially for the kids, is the Midway will open one night early on July 18 and this year the admission price will include the show for that day as well. We have the Georgia Moonshine Cruz-In on August 8-10, the Georgia State Hog Rally on September 13-14 and the fall will open with the Fall Festival on October 11-19. We are going to be busy with our music shows as well as the

Blairsville - During their regular monthly meeting on Thursday night at Meeks Park, The Good Neighbors Auto Club showed that they really are good neighbors when its members awarded monetary scholarships to six rising college freshmen who recently graduated from high school in three surrounding counties - Union, Towns, and Cherokee. The students were selected from these three counties because the membership of the Auto Club is comprised of these counties.

Ginger Rettstadt, Corresponding Secretary for the Auto Club said, "We have a huge car show annually in October at United Community Bank in Blairsville. It is

through this fundraiser that we raise money for the scholarships. This past October, we had a record number of cars in the car show - around 230 cars!

Up until this year, we gave out four scholarships, but this year, we are giving out six. This is the most we have ever given out."
