



The names on the petition ballots of five potential candidates for three seats on the Blue Ridge Mountain EMC board of directors have been verified as EMC members, EMC Director Steven Phillips said. In Union County, Mickey Cummings, Patrick Malone and Charles Rich have made the ballot, Phillips said. In Towns County, Roy Perren made the ballot; and in Fannin County, Larry Williams made the ballot. Williams is the only candidate in the Fannin County

The Georgia native who needs no introduction is coming to perform at the Georgia Mountain Fairgrounds' Anderson Music Hall on Saturday, Aug. 1, and he's excited to return to the area.

"It's beautiful, I love it," said Ray Stevens about the North Georgia Mountains. "Simply put, that's one of the nicest places in the world, as far as I'm concerned. I think so far I've been very lucky, and people have accepted me very well in your neck of the woods." Stevens has been a musical mainstay for nearly 60 years, with 11 Grammy nominations, two wins, close to 100 singles and dozens of albums to his credit, including hits like *The Streak*, *Gitarzan*, and *Everything Is Beautiful*. And this Saturday, Stevens will be doing what he does best. "The show is going to be vintage Ray Stevens," said Stevens. "I'm going to be doing a lot of my hits, old and

new, and a lot of other songs that I just like. And of course, I'm going to be talking about things, a little bit of conversation. It's more music, though, than anything else. I have a great band, and I think the folks will like it." With a songlist populated by the likes of *Gitarzan* and *Jeremiah Peabody*, to the recently released hit *Taylor Swift Is Stalkin' Me*, many may wonder how Stevens comes up with such colorful characters and song ideas. The Seventh Annual Georgia Mountain Moonshine Cruiz-In is rolling into town this week, and will feature hotrods galore and authentic moonshine demonstrations. For three full days, running Thursday, July 30, through Saturday, Aug. 1, the Cruiz-In promises family fun for all ages at the Georgia Mountain Fairgrounds. Growlers hit Bacchus shelves

Growlers have landed in Hiawassee, but don't be alarmed - they're not the kind with teeth. Thanks to the efforts of husband and wife team Ed Kountz and Linda Pallone, who own Bacchus Wine Shoppe on Main Street, the 32- and 64-ounce bottles of craft brew have become a reality. Bacchus Beer and Growlers will hold its Grand Opening with a ribbon-cutting ceremony by the Towns County Chamber of Commerce on Friday, July 31, at 3 p.m. In its March meeting, Hiawassee City Council amended the city's Ordinance for the Retail Sale of Beer and Wine to authorize "growlers" for the first time within city limits, allowing for an alternative to traditional bottled beer. Due to the space required to install the 8 feet by 8 feet walk-in cooler to house the kegs needed to pour growlers, the new operation is housed in the same building and next to the Wine Shoppe. "Currently, we've got 11 kegs live," said Kountz during the growler soft launch. "This is totally new, and this is totally different than any other beer store in Hiawassee - relatively new to the state of Georgia." Growlers came to Georgia about five years ago, and their popularity is spreading thanks to the ability of growler retailers to acquire choice selections and deliver them extra fresh to customers. "We've got everything from non-alcoholic root beer from Atlanta, to four or five other Georgia beers, including most recently Hiawassee Golden Ale from Fannin Brewing in Blue Ridge," said Kountz. "The beer comes from the keg, is pumped via a series of lines - they go through the wall and come through the taps on the other side. "We're very excited about this, and obviously with an 8-by-8, it allows us to do a number of things, one of which is to pour kind of on draught for tastings and to fill growlers, and the other is to do keg sales. It's new to Hiawassee, and we're very excited about the response we've gotten so far." When all is said and done, the growler side of the business will house a wide variety of hard-to-find room-temperature craft beers, as well as a steady rotation of the 15 growler taps to feature beer, hard cider and non-alcoholic sodas. Interest in the venture has already been piqued, according to Ray and Heather Wilson, who were up from Atlanta for a day out this past Saturday. "We saw it driving by," said Ray, who had not heard of growlers previously, but said that Bacchus seemed like a good place to bring friends. "I think it's a cool concept." Kountz, Pallone and their associates are staffing the shop and hoping to grow it, and those looking to expand their appreciation for the fine art of craft brews should check out the grand opening this Friday, located at 355 N Main St. in Hiawassee. "We'd like to thank the city and city council for their support," said Kountz. "We're excited, and we appreciate the support we've received already. From here, it's just about onward and upward."
