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Tax Free

Georgia will have a tax-free holiday weekend this year for the first time since 2009.

For some schools that have already returned to school, this comes a little too late as parents have already spent their hard-earned dollars on back to school clothing and supplies.

This year's tax holiday begins at 12:01 a.m., Friday, Aug. 10th, and ends at midnight, Aug. 11th, on Saturday.

During the holiday, shoppers can avoid paying the state tax on clothing and footwear items with a sales price of \$100 or less per item.

A single purchase, with a sales price of \$1,000 or less, on personal computers and personal computer-related accessories also can be had.

General school supplies to be used in the classroom or in classroom-related activities with a sales price of \$20 or less per item also are allowed.

The exemption does not apply to the following items: clothing accessories, jewelry, handbags, umbrellas, eyewear, watches, watchbands, cellular devices, furniture, or computer-related accessories designed for recreational use.

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Towns County start your engines as the Fourth Annual Georgia Mountain Moonshine Cruiz-in returns to Hiawassee on Thursday through Saturday.

Locals are cordially invited by none other than Rakes Parrish, promoter for the Cruiz-In.

"I would like to invite everyone to come out to join us for the Fourth Annual Mountain Moonshine Cruiz-In," Parrish said. "We are expecting more than 1,000 hot rods, classics, and muscle cars from all parts of the United States. We're going cruising! Exercise: 'It looked like the real thing'

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If you thought you were witnessing a catastrophic event occurring on Lake Chatuge on Tuesday, July 31st, your eyes were not deceiving you.

However, what you were actually seeing was a drill conducted by the Towns County Fire and Rescue, Clay County Fire and Rescue, U.S. Coast Guard Auxiliary-Flotilla 23, Towns County EMS, Clay County EMS, Towns County 911, Clay County 911, Clay County Sheriff's Office, Chatuge Regional Hospital, Georgia DNR, North Carolina DNR, Towns County Fire Corps, and "victims" from Towns County.

"The principal mission of this drill was to check unit communications between the participants. It also allowed us to check and evaluate inter-agency coordination, procedures, as well as plans and equipment necessary to deal with an actual major emergency on Lake Chatuge," said Towns County Fire Chief Mitch Floyd.

Commander Mark Moore, Towns County Fire and Rescue and Water Rescue and Recovery Team, agreed to design and coordinate a drill involving the collision of two pontoon boats near the GA/NC border.

Volunteer victims were identified and injuries were simulated by Towns County EMS personnel to realistically reflect serious injuries.

A "training dummy" was positioned in the lake to simulate a deceased victim that would be retrieved by Towns

County Fire Department's Water Rescue & Recovery Team divers.

Fire and Rescue units established an incident command post on the lake shore in the Chatuge Woods Campground area. Captain Terry Parker was the incident commander.

"Having commanded a Department of Defense Emergency Response Team and working with professional first responders for many years, I can tell you that every responder I witnessed working in this exercise performed with the best of them. From the Controllers/Evaluators all the way to the support staff on shore, they all exceeded expectations in carrying out their duties," said Moore.

Floyd was the chief controller for the incident. He was

assisted by Towns County Fire and Rescue's Ricky Mathis.

Commander Moore was the on-scene mobile coordinator. Side scan sonar and an underwater camera system was utilized to locate the deceased victim.

"The simulated exercise allowed the participating agencies to deal with a major incident with multiple victims in a real time environment which included the treatment and retrieval of victims from the water as well as transporting them to a medical facility. It also included the somber task of locating and recovering the body of a deceased victim from depth of approximately 25 feet," said Floyd.

The exercise was con-

Iconic businessman Hugh Hoodenpyle dies at age 88

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In 1991, a Democratic State Senator running for Congress approached then Towns County Schools Superintendent Bill Kendall for a favor.


He wanted Kendall to be his campaign chairman in Towns County in his bid for a seat in the U.S. Congress.

Kendall, facing his own election as Schools Superintendent, had to decline. He told the candidate vying to become the representative for Georgia's 9th Congressional District that he knew of someone else who could help.

Kendall directed State Sen. Nathan Deal (D-Gainesville) to Hugh Hoodenpyle, who gladly accepted the job.

It was the beginning of a long, long friendship between Deal and Hoodenpyle.

During Deal's 2010 GOP campaign for governor of Geor-

gia, his biggest supporter was a Democrat, Hugh Hoodenpyle.

On Saturday, Gov. Deal dropped all his appointments to come to Hiawassee. He was here to pay his final respects to a man he had come to know and love as a close personal friend for more than 20 years.

Hoodenpyle died Aug. 1 at Northeast Georgia Medical Center in Gainesville. He was

A typical band camp day is 9 a.m., stretching in the stadium; 9:30 a.m., basic block marching technique; 10 a.m., concert arc on the 50-yard-line; 10:30 a.m., marching drill and music; 11:30 a.m., group meeting; noon, break for lunch; 12:30 p.m., music rehearsal indoors; 2:30 p.m., new drill in stadium; 3:30 p.m., full band performance review in stadium; 4:30 p.m., animations study and review in the band room.

The students then leave to go home at 5 p.m.
