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



## Jean Kendall remembers the best days




## Elvis says: "I'm just Roy Perren"

## Ohio man charged with rape

A sexual abuse incident was reported to the Towns County Sheriff's Office in March of this year, according to the Towns County Sheriff's Office.

The incident allegedly occurred in October 2012 at a residence in Towns County, sheriff's reports show.

Sheriff's Investigators who were following up with the investigation recently located the suspect in Warren County, Ohio, sheriff's reports show.

Towns County investiga-

tors secured an arrest warrant for Paul Jason Brothers, 34, of Waynesville, Ohio, according to the Towns County Sheriff's Office Facebook page.

Warren County, Ohio Sheriff's officials picked up the suspect. Brothers waived extradition, and Towns County deputies transported him back to Towns County on Saturday, Aug. 10th, sheriff's reports show.

Brothers has been charged with one count of rape. He is being held in Towns County Detention Center at press time, according to the Towns County Sheriff's Office.

Towns County Fire Chief Mitch Floyd is ecstatic to bring the event back to the community for the first time since 2011.


The community seems anxious as well, Floyd said.
