## Moving Wall comes to Meeks Park

**Blairsville** - The Moving Wall Memorial is coming to Meeks Park in Blairsville, and will be available around the clock and free to the public during its stay between Thursday, Oct. 8, and Monday, Oct. 12.

Arriving that Thursday morning, The Moving Wall - a half-size replica of the Vietnam Veterans Memorial in Washington D.C. - will bring with it a time of silent reflection for the many brave members of the United States Armed Forces who died or are still missing as a result of the Vietnam War.

As of May 25, 2015, there are 58,307 names etched into the mirror-like black granite of The Moving Wall.

Among this enormous list of Vietnam War casualties gone but not forgotten are the names of area service members who lost their lives during the war.

## Sorghum Festival celebrates 46 years

The 46th Annual Blairsville Sorghum Festival is bringing its authentic brand of mountain heritage to Meeks Park the second and third weekends in October.

The festival kicks off Saturday, Oct. 10, when the Sorghum Mill gears up for the crushing and cooking of sorghum at 9 a.m. Vendors also begin to demonstrate and showcase their wares at this time, with live music shortly following at 10:30 a.m.

Also on Saturday, Oct. 10, the 2015 Sorghum Festival Parade makes its way from the Old Middle School Gym to Meeks Park.

This year's parade is all about patriotism, and float builders are encouraged to embrace the theme: "American Pride... All Gave Some... Some Gave All."

Special to this year's festival and parade is The Moving Wall, a half-size replica of the

The Moving Wall will arrive at Meeks Park on Thursday, Oct. 8, and will be on display around the clock until its closing ceremony on Monday, Oct. 12.

Festival Club decided to highlight The Wall's presence by incorporating the patriotic theme for this year's parade.

"We're trying to revolve everything around The Moving Wall," said Festival Club Treasurer Kim Bridges, who co-organized the festival. "The Wall won't be here the second

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## Barrett dies of natural causes on Georgia's Death Row

Winston Clay Barrett of Towns County, who was convicted of the Aug. 4, 2002, murder of his friend Danny "Stumpy" Youngblood, has died of natural causes, according to information obtained from the Georgia Department of Corrections by the Towns County Sheriff's Office.

Barrett, who would have turned 60 this October, died a death row inmate at Jackson State Prison, where he awaited an execution date for his death penalty conviction.

No foul play is suspected in Barrett's death, which occurred sometime over the weekend of Sept. 18, according to information available at press time.

Before his death, Barrett had exhausted all appeals processes in the state, having his convictions upheld by the Georgia Supreme Court in 2012.

According to Towns County Herald news archives,

Barrett's death penalty conviction was Towns County's first since the 1960s.

A Towns County Grand Jury indicted Barrett on Dec. 3, 2002, charging him with malice murder, aggravated assault, aggravated battery and two counts of possession of a firearm during the commission of a felony.

Enotah Circuit District Attorney Stan Gunter filed written notice of intent to seek the death penalty on Feb. 3, 2003.

## City Council forum set for Monday, Oct. 26th

The Towns County Homeowners Association, in conjunction with the Mountain Movers and Shakers, has scheduled a moderated discussion forum featuring Hiwassee City Council candidates.

The forum is set for 6:30 p.m. on Monday, Oct. 26 - a week before the Nov. 3 elections - and the forum will take place at the new Towns County Senior Center.

Planning for the forum occurred on Wednesday, Sept. 23, when the Mountain Movers and Shakers met with the TCHA to discuss sponsoring a public forum regarding the upcoming Hiwassee City Council elections.

The idea is to have members of the public come and ask questions of the candidates.

"This is a joint forum to allow the candidates and the incumbents for City Council positions in Hiwassee to tell us a little bit about themselves and discuss some of the issues to the public. Since there's no League of Women Voters anymore who typically sponsors these types of things, we felt like we would fill in the void and provide this forum for the community. This is a planning meeting for that," said Homeowners Association President Noel Turner.

Turner wanted to ensure that each candidate got a fair shot at answering questions.

"We're going to come up with some questions for them. My opinion is that we give them these questions in advance. I just think that these aren't professional politicians, which is a good thing. I think they'd have a better chance to give a more comprehensive answer if they know the question in advance so they can work on it rather than being surprised. A lot of them are new to this," he said.

It was Grace Howard's idea that the candidates should receive formal letters of invitation.

"I think from the joint group here, the letter should

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
