Technology as a tool for the Sheriff's Office

Technology can be a wonderful tool. When used properly, modern technology can accomplish much in a fast and efficient manner. There was a time not long ago when I used to write out police report narratives by hand.

A deputy in the same situation now would simply insert the information in the proper sequence, saving time and energy. It is not nearly as frustrating as starting a lengthy report from the beginning.

Another advantage of the technology we use at the sheriff's office is our reporting software, which allows us to compile reports based on all the information being entered constantly.

Recently, I spoke about the areas of Towns County in which we see most of our motor vehicle accidents. This information was available because of the ability to compare accident reports taken by deputies and then generate a report of when and where crashes happen in Towns County.
