Harvick wins at Phoenix

Carl Edwards looked like he was headed for a win in Sunday's Sprint Cup race, but one lap from the finish he ran out of gas. Kevin Harvick, who had earlier ran out of gas took the lead and went on to his fourth win of the season.

"We really weren't expecting to be handed the lead like that," said Harvick. "I thought that when we ran out of gas earlier, it killed our chance at winning. We had a really fast car, but the cautions seemed to work against us."

"I know it's a long shot to even think about winning the championship, but we've still got a shot."

Kasey Kahne finished second, with Jimmie Johnson third.

Johnson went into the race leading Matt Kenseth by seven points. Kenseth had a dull day and wound up 23rd. Johnson's lead is now 28 points over Kenseth and 34 ahead of Harvick.

Johnson, who started on the pole, had his own problems. He almost got spun around early in the race after contact with Carl Edwards. He was able to regroup and work his way back to the front.

Going into the race Kenseth was a real contender, but his car never had the speed to run up front. He started 14th and steadily fell back as the race continued.

"This was not a good day for us, but we've had an incredible season," said Kenseth. "I'm thankful for all my guys because they've worked so hard, and there's still one race to go."

While it's possible that either Harvick or Kenseth could beat out Johnson in the last race at Homestead, all Johnson has to do to win this year's Chase is finish 23rd or better.

"ROWDY" KYLE CRUISES TO NATIONWIDE WIN

Kyle Busch led 169 laps of Saturday's 200-lap Phoenix Nationwide race for his 12th win of the season. Austin Dillon was running second until he was passed on the last lap by Justin Allgaier. Neither of the two drivers posed any threat to Busch,

as he crossed the finish line by 4.347-seconds ahead of runner-up Allgaier.

The only driver that could run with Busch was Brad Keselowski, who led seven laps, but was bumped from behind by Brian Scott on lap 143, and smacked the outside wall. His team made repairs to the rear of his car and he finished 19th, one lap down.

"It was certainly a great day for us," Busch said. "It's a testament to (crew chief) Adam Stevens and the group of guys that he's got around us that do such a great job for us and work real hard and give us some great equipment."

Austin Dillon finished third, while Regan Smith was fourth. Sam Hornish was fifth and now trails Dillon by eight points in the series championship points with one race left. Matt Kenseth was sixth, followed by Trevor Bayne, Elliott Sadler, Kevin Harvick, and Ryan Blaney.

BURTON MAKES 1000TH START

While Jimmie Johnson and Matt Kenseth were battling for the lead in this year's championship Chase at Phoenix, Jeff Burton was making his 1,000th NASCAR start.

During a NASCAR career spanning more than 25 years, Burton has 48 wins, including victories in the Southern 500 at Darlington Raceway and the Coca-Cola 600 at Charlotte Motor Speedway. The South Boston, Va., native has earned more than

250 top-five and 400, top-10 finishes; was named the 1994 Sprint Cup Series "Rookie of the Year" and co-piloted the No. 29 Richard Childress Racing Chevrolet to the 2007 NASCAR Nationwide Series owner's championship.

"It's hard for me to imagine that I have driven in 1,000 NASCAR races," said Burton. "I've been lucky and blessed to have family and friends that have given me all this support. I also have good relationships with everyone that I've worked with over the years to show for it, which is most important to me."

Overall, the 46-year-old driver has made 689 Sprint Cup Series starts along with 306 starts in the Nationwide Series and four starts in the NASCAR Camping World Truck Series driving for Richard Childress Racing, Roush Fenway Racing and the Stavola Brothers. Burton is the last driver to lead 100 per cent of the laps in a NASCAR-sanctioned event, pacing the field for all 300 laps en route to victory at New Hampshire Motor Speedway in 2000 and was the 2007 NASCAR Illustrated "Person of the Year."

He currently sits 19th in the 2013 Sprint Cup Series driver championship point standings on the strength of two top-five and six top-10 finishes.

His future is unclear. But he said at Phoenix, that he "had something in the works".

TCMS basketball swept at Union

Blairsville - The season is off to a rocky start for the boys' and girls' Towns County Middle School basketball teams. The teams traveled away to Union county, where they faced off against the Panthers. The girls lost 41-12, and the boys lost 40-4.

With the end of softball season, many middle school softball players such as Lea Underwood have made the switch to basketball. However, the sudden switch hasn't given the girls' team much chance to practice before the beginning of the season. The end of the first half saw Union County leading 32-6. Though Towns County battled back somewhat during the third quarter, bringing the score to 34-12, Union held on to its lead and ended the game 41-12.

"With less than two weeks to prepare for the first game, the amount of defensive plays and offensive plays which you have to go over in addition to conditioning, it's really hard to get prepared," Coach Carrie Abernathy said. The girls' basketball coaches also added that Towns County's performance might have had something to do with first-game jitters. If the athletes feel underprepared, they may lack confidence, which is an

important element in any sport. "I think were a factor in not being confident in their skills and their ability, which they do have," Abernathy admitted.

Coach Lana Parker noted that the girls have work to do. "We have just a lot of girls that really need to practice away from the court," she said. "We need to work on the defense, and we on getting up and down the court."

The boys' team fared even worse. Union pulled ahead by 15 points in the first quarter, which ended 15-1 in favor of the Panthers. They increased their lead to 28-1 in the second quarter. The third quarter ends 32-3, and the fourth quarter ended 40-4.

"We didn't play well. We didn't execute. We had no focus on what we wanted to get accomplished," said Coach Daryl McClure, who seemed to blame himself for the hard loss. "That's a coaches responsibility, to get his team to understand what they need to do to compete." He added that the Towns' boys needed to work on the technical aspects of their game, including executing our offensive plays, getting and making easy shots, playing great defense. However, he did note that the season would offer opportunities for improvement and growth. "We've got a lot we need to do," he said. "There's potential here."
