Hiawassee Police Chief Jimmy Wright laid to rest

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Hiawassee Police Chief Jimmy Wright would have been in awe of the send off he received last week.

After all, he had the best seat in the house as hundreds packed McConnell Baptist Church to pay their last respects to Chief Wright, who died Dec. 13 of natural causes.

The 50-year-old Wright was a 25-year law enforcement veteran in Towns County and Hiawassee.

The law enforcement presence for the funeral was astounding as agencies from across Northeast Georgia attended services for Chief Wright.

Jimmy Paul Wright grew up in Towns County and dedicated his adult life to law enforcement. He began his career as

Working to fill a need

for the community's underprivileged children, Chief Wright started the Shop With a Cop program, which provides Christmas for what Chief

Wright called the 'tweeners,' or children ages 12-17, who seemingly had fallen between the cracks. The program continues

to be a huge success today as underprivileged children gathered with law enforcement volunteers on Friday, Dec. 18 at Walmart in Blairsville.

It was the only Shop With a Cop event that Chief Wright had ever missed.

This year's Shop With a Cop was dedicated to Chief Wright by Hiawassee Mayor Barbara Mathis, and the event carried on with not one, but two Wrights - Brittany and Jared, his daughter and son - holding the torch in their father's absence.

"It was definitely a great passion of his, and we just wanted to be here ourselves today in his memory," Brittany said.

For Jared, this was actually his third Shop With a Cop. Jared is currently stationed at Pearl Harbor with the U.S. Navy, but before joining the

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BOE rewards its teachers for longevity

On Monday, Dec. 14, the Towns County Board of Education voted on an issue near and dear to many teachers' hearts: the number of allowable personal days.

"The personal leave policy that we currently have, it goes by what the state recommendation is, which means that regardless, every teacher has three personal days that they can take. We've ran into a few issues in the past couple of years where a teacher who's been here a long time has a lot of sick days built up, and so if something occurs where they need to take that fourth personal day, they have to get docked for that day, and I hate doing that, but that's our

policy and we have to do it," said Towns County Superintendent of Schools Dr. Darren Berrong.

"So the policy we're looking at changing is that any employees who have been with the system for less than 10 years will get those three personal days of leave per year.
