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## Fifth-ranked Indians drop nail-biter against Class 7A Collins Hill

Suwannee - Even though the Indians' Dec. 28 game at Athens Academy was canceled, Head Basketball Coach Rob Benson was able to schedule a game with Collins Hill in Suwannee on Saturday, Jan. 2.

The Indians, who headed into the game with a 4-0 record and 1-0 in the region, traveled to Gwinnett County Saturday to face off against the 14th-ranked Class 7A Collins Hill Eagles. Benson was unable to

travel with the team due to the last-minute scheduling and being away on holiday, so Assistant Coach Alan Rogers filled in to coach the Indians. Rogers is in his sixth season as assistant coach and is the Indians Junior Varsity head

Towns County got off to a hot start, as senior Kolby Moss and junior Jake McTaggart hit two 3-pointers in a row for a 6-2 lead.

The Eagles, whose football team faced Grayson in the State Championship Game two days earlier, managed to take a 15-10 lead midway through the first when a bucket from senior Aidan Berrong and a 3-pointer from senior Kabe Ellis tied things at 15 with just over three minutes left in the quarter, though Collins Hill ended the first quarter with a 21-20 lead.

Much like the first quarter, the second quarter was a back-and-forth battle between the Indians and the Eagles. But with just over two minutes left in the half, Collins Hill went on a 12-0 streak to take a 44-32 lead.
