

On May 16, Stephen Weaver, President of the Blue Ridge Mountains Chapter, Georgia Society, the Sons of the American Revolution (SAR), presented the Blue Star Banner and SAR certificate to Mr. Thomas Nault.

Nault received the banner and certificate "for the support and sacrifice in having his son Capt. Michael Tyler Nault, a C17 pilot and aircraft commander in the 16th Airlift Squadron of the 437th Airlift Wing stationed at Joint Base Charleston, South Carolina. Michael previously was a T6 Instructor Pilot and Functional Check Pilot based at Columbus AFB in Columbus, MS." "Blue Star Banners" represent a family's loved one who is serving their country in the U.S. military, while the "Gold Star Banner" refers to the loss of a family member in military service. For example, the mother of a son/daughter who died in service is referred to as a "Gold Star Mother." The last Sunday in September is observed as Gold Star Mother's Day. The practice actually started in 1917 as a father's way to honor his two sons serving on the front lines during World War I. Army Capt. Robert L. Queissner of the 5th Ohio Infantry designed and patented this symbol of honor. On September 24, 1917, the flag was officially acknowledged in the Congressional Record in Ohio, commemorated with these words: "The world should know of those who give so much for liberty. The dearest thing in the entire world to a father and mother – their children." During World War II, the Department of War issued specifications on the manufacture of the banner as well as guidelines indicating when and by whom the service ban-

ner could be flown. The Department of Defense updated the guidelines on December 1, 1967, with an Act of Congress at skunkflats@windstream. authorizing a service banner. The image is easily recognizable as a single blue or gold star, floating on a crisp white background and surrounded by a red border. A banner may include up to five stars – one for each family member on active duty or who died while serving our nation.

500 million gallons of water taking questions himself. from Lake Chatuge each year to treat for home consumption, and the city needs to add a third filter and building to house it just to keep up with demand for the foreseeable future, with a projected cost of around \$3 million.

Moving on, Ordiales said she was thankful for State Sen. Steve Gooch upping the state's grant appropriation to about \$72,000 for sidewalk revitalization, which, with the city match of \$30,000, has helped replace sidewalks between Hiawassee Brewery and Ross Lloyd Road.

She went over the new hotel-motel tax rate that starts this month, which the city recently increased from 5% to 8% to raise additional revenues. These revenues will go toward "signage for the city, fishing piers, parks and recreation - anything that would help bring tourists here."

"And the majority of it will go to the (Lake Chatuge Chamber of Commerce)," she said, "which is the big plus here, because now they can bring more events to town."

Speaking next on the local impact of package liquor stores that have opened in town, Ordiales said two stores brought in more than \$2.4 million in revenue to the city over a one-year period, equating to about \$75,000 in additional tax money to Hiawassee.

Those \$2.4 million were going to Hayesville, (North Carolina)," she said, noting that the original decision to put liquor stores on the ballot was purely an economic one.

She then turned to the impending construction of the Lake Chatuge Boardwalk that will connect Lloyd's Landing and Hiawassee Mayor's Park, to feature two fishing piers and total city walkability.

"That came from a \$690,000 grant from the Appalachian Regional Commission," Ordiales said. "It's about an \$800,000 project ... we put in \$110,000, and we'll have this great boardwalk."

Added Ordiales, "It's in the engineering phase now we just awarded the contract for that. We have to wait for the lake to go down, so December/ January there will be sub-pilings and stuff going on.'

As for the Paris Business Center, a major enterprise by the city and Hiawassee Downtown Development Association that will help start-up businesses succeed in the city and county, Ordiales said the project was still raising money and progressing toward further construction.

The city-owned Paris Buildings will feature a 4,000-square-foot "seafood restaurant" – to be officially announced later - with a rooftop bar and dining area, plus a business incubator and two retail storefronts that will house a rotating roster of new local businesses. Business center funding is being split between grants, donations and loans, with costs having ballooned from \$1.3 million to \$2.4 million since the start of the pandemic. The DDA will be hosting a Jimmy Buffet tribute concert fundraiser this summer, so stay tuned for more details. Ordiales offered more than a dozen additional city updates and answered a few questions before turning things over to Hiawassee Police Chief Parker, who spent a few minutes introducing himself before

Of note, Parker responded "unequivocally no" to an audience member asking if there had been a resolution to the behind-the-scenes feud between the city Police Department and the Towns County Sheriff's Of-

fice "I have not even been able to have a conversation with the administration at the Sheriff's Office," said Parker, who inherited the long-running conflict after starting with the city Christmas Eve. "So, I'm not sure where the problem even lies.

"My goal would be to sit down and talk about (the issue) and try to find some resolve or agree to disagree, but at least have that conversation. That's what I want for the city. And I want the deputies to know that, if they are in a situation and need backup, my people are coming.

Added Parker, "I'll deal with the bureaucratic stuff later, but I'm telling you, if there's an officer on the side of the road and he's calling for help, I've told my guys, 'You better go' .. (and) I want my guys to know that if they call for help or feel unsafe, that somebody's coming

"My goal for any public safety that I am affiliated with is that we all go home at the end of the day, because we put our lives on the line to save others, but we also need to be able to take our lives back home to our families.'

He did say, however, that the Police Department and the "line staff" at the Sheriff's Office work well together.

"Something to consider here," Ordiales said, "all of us - the Police Department, the Sheriff's Office, the mayor, the city clerk - we all took an oath to protect and serve this community, and that is what we are going to do, period. That is our No. 1 priority."

Responding to another question about the city's policy on high-speed pursuits, Parker reiterated that his officers do chase suspects under certain conditions - i.e., going after violent offenders and reckless drivers - but they always exercise "due regard" for the motoring public's safety.

In addition to Chief Parker, the Hiawassee Police Department has three full-time officers: James Murray, Bill Conway and Jose Carvaial.

The officers work one at a time in 12-hour shifts to cover the city 24 hours a day,

seven days a week, and Parker said his department is looking to hire a part-time officer to help share the workload.
