Greensboro - Towns County suffered a tough loss on Friday at Lake Oconee Academy (LOA) in a 27-0

LOA churned out a balanced 427 yards of total offense (215 passing and 213 rushing) while limiting the Indians to 83 yards through the air and 59 on the ground.

"We got exposed, very similar to last week," commented Towns County head coach Jason Roquemore, who believes LOA took advantage of the Indians' youth. "Where last week we got exposed up front, this week we got exposed on the perimeter. We just had some young players in key spots. We were starting two sophomore corners and starting a sophomore safety."

The home team set the tone early via a 39-yard carry on the first play from scrimmage. The Titans capped the drive with a 9-yard touchdown strike on third and goal.

After a field goal made it 10-0, LOA added another touchdown pass in the second for a 17-0 score. The half ended with LOA's 23-yard field goal, upping their advantage to 20-0 as the teams cleared the field for the halftime per-


