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## Indians fall 31-14 at Armuchee; home opener vs. Pinecrest Academy Friday

The Towns County Indians took to the road on Friday, Aug. 27, for a matchup against the Armuchee Indians of Rome, Georgia, as they tried to remain unbeaten after a 1-0 season

Armuchee won the coin toss and elected to receive the ball, returning the opening kickoff for 40 yards and great

Friday's matchup in Rome was a chippy one, with a lot of extra pushing and shoving after the whistle, and with Armuchee facing a threeand-out, the Indians were called for offsides, giving Armuchee a fresh set of downs in Towns County territory.

The Boys in Blue were flagged once again but for unsportsmanlike conduct, putting Armuchee inside the 20yard line. Armuchee made it to the 10-yard line and drew first blood, taking a 7-0 lead over Towns County with more than 10 minutes left in the first

Senior Collin Crowder returned the kickoff to the Towns 30-yard line. Led by sophomore Ouarterback Connor Chastain. the Indians moved the ball well, getting onto Armuchee's side of the field.

Following a quick threeand-out, Towns County was forced to punt the ball away with just under three minutes left in the first quarter.

But the Indians defense answered back with a quick

forcing Armuchee to punt the ball back to the Indians at around the two-minute mark

punt for 15 yards to give the midfield. Indians a first-and-10 at their own 45-yard line.

After a couple plays, first quarter. Towns was facing a third-and-7 at less than a minute left in the ties called against the Boys in quarter. With 39 seconds to go and needing a big play, Offensive Coordinator and Play Caller Evan Woodard instructed Chastain to throw a bomb down three-and-out of their own, the Indians sideline.

After several more penal-Blue, the Indians found themselves with their backs against their own goal line again, and Armuchee rediscovered the end zone to expand their lead to 14-0 over the Indians with 9:19

The Indians consistently moved the ball well but were simply unable to capitalize and put points on the board, and penalties plagued Towns County in the first half.

After another good drive, the Indians found themselves inside Armuchee territory. With 2:04 left in the first half, senior Tailback Kyle Oakes scampered 37 yards into the end zone for a Towns County Touchdown to get back within a score.

The Indians trailed 14-7 at the half. After re-emerging

from the locker room, there was a short lightning delay that forced players and spectators alike to vacate the stadium and head into the school gymnasium until it was deemed safe to return to action.

Towns received the ball to start the second half but struggled to play to their capabilities, Head Coach Jason Roquemore said.

The Armuchee defense held the Indians offense to another three-and-out, requiring the Indians to punt the ball away. Armuchee found the end

zone once again in the third

Indians Offense once more started moving the ball well in the fourth quarter after a 40-yard pass from Chastain to sophomore Wide Receiver Stone Chauncey to put them inside the 5-yard line, and on the following play, Oakes scored from 2 yards out for another Towns Touchdown.

With a good point-after attempt, the Indians trailed 21-14 with just over 10 minutes left in the game.

The Indians would give up 10 more points to fall 31-14 in Rome, handing the Towns County team its first loss of the season.

Chastain finished with 13-20 for 109 yards and an interception in the air. Chauncey hauled in one catch for 40 yards. Sophomore Colton Garrett finished with two catches for 18 yards, and Crowder had six catches for 20 yards. Oakes carried the ball 22 times for 152 vards and 2 scores.

The Indians ended the game with 263 yards of total offense: 109 passing and 154

Defensive performers were sophomore Seth Gillis, who led the team with 12 tackles and one tackle for loss. while Oakes finished with six

The Indians will host Pinecrest Academy on Friday, Sept. 3, at Frank McClure Stadium for the Boys in Blue's home opener. Kickoff is at 7:30 p.m.
