Indians run 'out of gas' in 42-28 Homecoming loss

In a thrillingly close showdown last Friday night at the Homecoming game, the Towns County Indians fell short against Coosa with a final score of 42-28.

The first quarter netted Coosa two scores to Towns' one, setting Coosa ahead at 14-6.

After two touchdowns by the Indians in the second quarter as well as another Coosa touchdown, Towns narrowed the gap to 21-20 at the break.

After some well-crafted plays to move the ball down the field in the third quarter, Towns took the lead briefly at 28-21 before another Coosa touchdown tied up the score at 28-28. The final quarter proved unfavorable for the Indians with Coosa tacking on two more touchdowns and the Eagles walked away with a 42-28 victory.

The rushing game stood out for both teams, with Towns amassing an impressive 293 yards from 38 carries, while Coosa gained 272 yards on 36 carries.


The Lady Indians had a great week of softball, collecting three blowout victories over larger schools.
