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Softball: Towns punches ticket to postseason on Senior Day

Following a tough week of back-to-back losses, the Lady Indians have turned around their fate and won a ticket to the playoffs with two consecutive victories against Georgia School For Innovation and Classics.

“For the seniors, this was it,” commented Coach Clay Livingston. “This was their chance to get back in the playoffs and they took care of business, so I’m proud of them.”

To secure their spot in the acclaimed high school sports realm, they first had to beat their opponent on an unfamiliar field last Tuesday. A nearly 4-hour bus ride brought the girls to Hephzibah, Georgia, where they blew the game out of the water with a 8-0 win.

Continuing on with a clear goal in sight, the Lady Indians fought hard Saturday afternoon to set their involvement in the playoffs in stone with a 8-5 victory against GSIC on Lowell Nicholson Field.

Towns initially took the lead, scoring 4 points before GSIC ever passed the plate. However, things started looking grim for the Lady Indians as GSIC caught up, even briefly taking the lead by a run before the score settled at 5-5.

This win made Sat. an extra special afternoon for the team – especially the seniors,

who were honored with posters and a heartwarming senior-night ceremony. Families were able to decorate a table for their senior, adorning it with pictures, helmets, old bats and whatever other nostalgic items they could think of. After the

game, the senior girls were lined up on the field where they were bombarded with bouquets and hugs.

Saturday’s game wasn’t only monumental for the seniors, however; the win also meant great things for the rest

of the team.



Football: No. 7 Aquinas overwhelms Indians with 40-unanswered points

Under the misty lights of Frank McClure stadium last Friday night, Oct. 6, the Towns County Indians took a landslide loss of 40-6 to Aquinas.

From the start, the Indians had trouble getting ahead. In the first quarter, Aquinas had earned 19 points from 3 touchdowns – a streak they mirrored again in the 2nd quarter to set the score at 40-0.

During halftime, the Towns County Marching Band was forced quickly off the field to spare their equipment from the drizzling rain. While the weeping skies put a stop to the band’s performance, the football teams weren’t shaken, taking the field for the third quarter.

Towns county was able to put together some success in the second half, keeping Aquinas’ offense stagnant and earning one touchdown themselves. The final score, however, favored Aquinas 40-6.

In passing, Towns gained 1-8 for 7 yards compared to Aquinas’ 8-9 for 197. Aquinas had 13 carries for 115

yards, scoring 2 touchdowns in rushing, with Towns completing 35 carries for 137 yards a touchdown.

Aquinas had 22 total plays of 14.2 yards per each,

of our kids and the resilience that they showed,” commented Coach Jason Roquemore. “The first half kind of got away from us, but there was no drop off in our effort and we made some adjustments and had some success there in the second half.”

As Roquemore has emphasized in the past, football is a team effort – but that doesn’t mean individual highlights and contributions should be ignored. Friday night, Colton Garrett executed 7 tackles and 1 tackle for loss. Julian Mosley made 4 tackles, 1 forced fumble, and 1 catch for 7 yards. Connor Chastain

contributed 7 tackles alongside Ian Arrowood’s 5.

While all of these players were essential to the Indians’ overall success in the second half, Roquemore gave a special shoutout to Morgan Walker, who tallied 144 yards rushing, 5 tackles, and gained Towns their lone touchdown of the night.

“Morgan really stepped in. Dustin was out – he was unavailable to play, and [Morgan] came in and ran the football really really hard while also

playing really really well on defense. I’m proud of his effort,” said Roquemore.

On Friday, the Indians play a home game at 7:30 p.m. vs. Johnson, where Roquemore served as head coach for 7 years.

“Those kids are going to come up here and expect to win and play hard. They’re gonna be prepared,” said Roquemore. “so we’re gonna come in and make a plan and get ready to play.”
